Combine this with a tour of the school lead by our impressive senior students, attendance at Winter Magic Market, show bags, the friendliness of office, Sprout and teaching staff on the tour, the effervescent ambience of classroom learning, music, art, language and life saturating our buildings, and parents and carers have been keen to enrol their children. We have been notified that we are entitled to an additional double classroom, demountable building. These two extra classrooms will provide for the expected growth in the number of classroom groups in 2017. Buildings and Grounds committee from School Council have been working on a number of proposals in regards to the siting of this building. We are fortunate to have parents willing to give their time and expertise in design work to support the evolving infrastructure of our school. Accommodating these new facilities in terms of our school landscape, the desire to retain as

much paved play area and the increasing need for storage for bikes and gardening equipment, has led to some creative solutions. I will outline the intended location for this building to the school community in the next few weeks. This will include the advantages of this development and related impact on existing elements of our grounds.

# ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Today I caught myself sitting here in my office, dreaming of riding horses through the hilltops, dining with 100 unaccompanied-children and dropping 18m after cutting my own cord, and I realised that I wish I was on school camp! Camps are fun. But are they important? Is there more to them than just silly games and crazy songs? My answer is undoubtedly – YES! School camp is a fantastic opportunity for children to develop new skills, friendships and interests. However, for many kids (and their parents!) just the thought of sleeping away from home can provoke anxiety around not being able to sleep properly, not liking the food camp will offer, feeling homesick or not being able to do the activities.

While camp (or as is more often the case, the lead up to camp) can be a nerve-wracking experience for some; for most, the benefits far outweigh the potential concerns and focussing on these positive aspects is a fantastic way to gently encourage some of those who are unsure about the whole experience.

So what are the benefits of going on school camp?

## DEVELOPMENT OF SOCIAL SKILLS

School camp is a great opportunity to develop a range of social skills. Most activities at camp involve team work, which is great to strengthen established friendships and also to develop new friendships by connecting with children they don't regularly talk, play or work with at school.

Through bonding activities and teamwork tasks, children develop supportive relationships not only with different children, but also with their teachers. At camp, children have the opportunity to learn about acceptance, caring and understanding.

## DEVELOPMENT OF INDEPENDENCE SKILLS

For many children school camp is their first time away from family and home for a few nights. Parents are not there to remind their kids to eat their vegetables, brush their teeth, or to have a shower.

Therefore, this is a great opportunity for kids to grow up by learning how take care of themselves and to do things on their own. Most kids do rise to the challenge and learn to rely on themselves when they spend time away home; they enjoy this new found independence and recognise the need to look after themselves, each other and their environment.

And for those who don't manage on their own, there are worse things than a night or two without a shower. In fact, during my last school camp I thought about starting a thesis on the correlation between how muddy our children were and how happy they appeared to be.

## DEVELOPMENT OF PROBLEM SOLVING SKILLS

At school camp, children figure out how to make important decisions, care for others and think like a leader. Camp gives them the freedom to make decisions in a controlled environment. This minimises risks, but also allows them to see a completely new side of themselves that they did not know existed. Whether working as a team to complete a challenge on the initiatives course or solving the problem of how to get the sleeping bag back in its sack, camp offers students the time, space and support to think outside the square, use what's available and persist until the problem is solved!

## INCREASED ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS

During camp, children are exposed to authentic nature-based experiences. Hands-on activities in the outdoors stimulate all senses and facilitate learning. Children become more aware of the environment, develop outdoor skills and appreciation for nature. We may be an awesome school with sticks and cubbies and rock walls, but we are still in the middle of Brunswick! There is nothing like being away from the city and for some of our students, camp is their main chance to experience this.

## TRYING NEW THINGS

At school camp, children will be exposed to a range of activities that they may not have tried before. When away from their parents, children are often more adventurous and willing to try new things. I have started many a camp with children telling me that "I don't eat (this)." and "I don't enjoy (that).", but with a bit of freedom, gentle encouragement and plenty of support, many of our students walk away exclaiming with delight "I didn't know I could do (this)!" or "I have never even tried (that)!"

The healthy and nurturing environment provided at school camp helps in developing resilience, forming social relationships and inciting curiosity. Children learn to try new things without grumbling, to get back up when they fail and to treat every failed attempt as a stepping-stone to improvement. In the course of the camp, they come to accomplish feats they did not think they were capable of achieving and will hopefully learn that just like on camp, with the right tools and enthusiasm, they can achieve virtually anything they set their mind to.

Hello there everyone,

There are a couple of things I ask you to keep in mind please. Here at sprout we are not like a regular cafe or shop. We operate in a pretty limited time frame and as we prepare all the snacks and lunches daily, this means we are in turn limited in the amount we can produce per day. So! I ask that you limit the amount of money you provide for your child's recess. Lately we have been seeing a few five and ten dollar notes. Why is this a problem? Ok, so, your child comes to school with \$5 and is feeling cashed up and generous. They come to the canteen at recess and decide to shout their friends a mini muffin each, that means 5 other children who have brought their own money for a mini muffin miss out. There are only so many mini muffins I can make before recess. Now translate that to \$10! I hope you can see where I am going with this! The biscuits and muffins we make are designed to support your child's learning through the next session and are generally

pretty low GI. \$3 should be plenty - this will buy you a bag of popcorn and a full size muffin or Trevor Biscuit.

Also, please be aware that lunches cannot be ordered over the counter at lunchtime. Please make sure your child has a written lunch order to send to the canteen at the start of the day. The systems we have in place benefit everyone and mean that Sprout can provide the quality of snacks and lunches that we do. Your cooperation is much appreciated.

And as a final reminder, the canteen is completely closed each Wednesday. There are no lunch orders or recess available on Wednesdays.
